

Letter from LUC President

Dear LUC Family,

In preparation for this issue of 'LUC Action' I was reviewing our last edition published this past February. This issue was full of plans taking form for the spring and fall. Our Lenten retreat with Father Canavan, North Anthracite members trip to New York City, our much anticipated Convention 2020 in the beautiful Mohawk Valley. Even though it was February, spring was definitely in the air. You could feel it, taste it, smell it. We were all looking forward to this glorious new year 2020.

On yet another horizon, we were concluding the UGCC Vision 2020, shifting focus to the impact of 'Immigration, Migration, Settlements and Unity' on our Church. In this context, parishes gathered together to discuss what unites us to our fellow UGCC faithful and what stands in the way.

Little did we expect to be catapulted into the biggest test of unity in our time. Who would have predicted our lives would be tossed around as it has been these recent months? Who could have predicted our Great Fast and Resurrection would be so hands off? Who would have thought our churches, our spiritual home, would be closed and off limits? Our dear clergy, thrown into an unthinkable situation, barring the very people they serve. Our loved ones dying alone, without the benefit and dignity of sacraments. Lay and clergy alike, cut off from the very spring which refreshes and sustains us.

Additional distress from parallel and equally disturbing events have weighed heavily on our souls. Much needed spiritual support was withdrawn and withheld: Retreats, pilgrimages: cancelled. Conferences, sobors: cancelled. Gatherings of any kind: cancelled!

We are all familiar with the saying 'when one door closes, another one opens'. Our National Board of Directors met with Archbishop Borys Gudziak on October 11th last year. He listened attentively to our concerns and challenges as an organization. In turn, he offered some sage advice. 'Listen in silence...listen to God's voice instead of your own...what is it that God wants you to do"? Eventually, we discern His will for us, understanding the 'other door' opening as a new opportunity to shine by serving Him, not ourselves.

The other phrase which comes to mind "adaptation is the key to survival". That day, Archbishop Borys gave us each a beautiful book: 'Persecuted for the Faith'. This book is a testament to the resilience of our people, our Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church, which under the most adverse conditions, struggled to survive by adapting to underground conditions. The need to unite, to be stronger than our adversary, transformed surviving into thriving, a testament to our strong and courageous leadership. How prophetic that Archbishop Borys, on that day, gave us these spiritual tools for us to put to use today.

There is no doubt that this storm is longer and stronger than we were ever prepared for. We have grown weary and need of a sense of understanding the spiritual significance and opportunity that lies hidden in the events of the past 6 months. Instead of cancelling our Convention 2020 we are transforming it. In a demonstration of spiritual unity, the League of Ukrainian Catholics together with Mother's in Prayer and our spiritual leadership are presenting a virtual conference: 'Transforming Calamity into Unity, Dignity and Healing'. The poster and program are published in this issue of Action. Please share this unique opportunity with others as all can benefit from it. This is a free, online event which will open on October 10th, 2020, with registration beginning September 1st. Registrants will receive a link by e-mail to take part in the program.

We are grateful to our amazing UGCC leadership; Archbishop Borys and Bishops Andrij, Benedict, Bohdan and Paul for embracing this opportunity to spiritually support and strengthen us through

The Holy Feasts of Transfiguration and Dormition

During the month of August the Church celebrates two great holydays: the Transfiguration of Our Lord Jesus Christ and the Dormition or Falling Asleep of the Mother of God.

The Feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord is on August 6th. This feast is described in the three Synoptic Gospels (Mt.17:1-8; Mk.9:1-7; Lk. 9:28-36).

In II Peter 1:16-18, we read "We have seen His majesty for ourselves. He was honored and glorified by God the Father, when He spoke to Him and said: 'This is my beloved Son, in Whom I am well pleased.' We have heard this ourselves spoken from heaven, when we were with Him on the Holy Mountain."

The Three Persons of the Holy Trinity were manifested for a second time: God the Father spoke, God the Son who is Jesus Himself, and God the Holy Spirit in the form of a cloud. Jesus leads three of his closest disciples on Mount Tabor. There, before their eyes, he was filled with the glory that is His as God, his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became white as light. (Mt. 17:2) Then behold, a bright cloud cast a shadow over them, like the dove at the Jordan, and from the cloud

came a voice that said, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am of the well pleased". Peter, James and John then saw the same revelation of the Trinity that had been seen by John the Baptist at the River Jordan.

This Feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord was celebrated from the fourth century. Saints Cyril of Jerusalem (386 A.D.), St. Jerome of Bethlehem (420), and St. Proclus of Constantinople (447) all testify that Our Lord was transfigured on Mt. Tabor.

There are several themes presented by this holyday: first, theologically, it manifests the divinity of Jesus Christ—his body is glorified; there is the testimony of Moses and Elijah and the Father's voice from heaven.

The second theme is the encouragement of the Apostles to trust in Jesus as they would soon face the humiliating passion of Jesus. St. Luke mentions that Moses and Elijah "were speaking of His passing (death) which He was to accomplish in Jerusalem." (Lk. 9:31)

Third theme is the assurance of our own participation in Christ's glory. During Matins, the morning prayer of the church, we profess "As You were transfigured on Mt. Tabor, O Savior, you manifested the transformation of mankind by Your glory, which will take place at Your awesome second coming." Thus the entire liturgy is filled with a joyful assurance, encouragement, and hope of our own glorification with Jesus as we "grow brighter and brighter into His image." (IICor. 3:18)

The fourth theme is the celebration of the feast falls at the time when we celebrate the first fruits of the harvest. This is taken from

the Old Testament where it was known as the Feast of the Tabernacles or Tents. It is a time to rejoice, to thank God for all that God gave us and we give back to God in return "Everyone shall give as he is able according to the blessing of the Lord your God that He has

given you." (Dt. 16:17). Our Church upholds this tradition by blessing the fruits in church from Apostolic times. In about 220 A.D. St. Hippolytus mentioned these fruits were blessed: grapes, figs, pomegranates, pears, mulberries, peaches and almonds. In Ukraine the fruits of the season are apples, plums and pears which were brought to the church and blessed. In the United States other seasonal fruits are also blessed.

On August 15th we celebrate the "Falling Asleep of the Mother of God" or the Dormition or Assumption of the Mother of God. It is one of the twelve major feast days of the Church. Since the beginning of the fourth century, Mary was publicly venerated because she was the Mother of Christ our God or the Theotokos. This was confirmed by the Council of Ephesus in 431 A.D. According to tradition, that at the time of Mary's glorious dormition, all the apostles were miraculously brought together to Jerusalem. They prayed and

commended her holy soul to God and carried her sacred body in a procession to Gethsemani and placed it in a tomb. Angels sang above her tomb for three days. St. Thomas was not present but

came three days later and wanted to honor Mary and venerate the body that gave birth to Christ. Upon opening the tomb the apostles found no trace of Mary's body but the tomb was filled with fragrant flowers. After closing the tomb, the apostles believed that The Son of God who was the Son of Mary took her body to heaven so that it would honored with incorruptibility forever. In the sixth century the Feast of the Dormition was established and celebrated on August 15 in the entire Byzantine Empire. By the seventh century it was introduced to the Western Church or Rome.

In preparation for this major feast, a two week fast is prescribed by the church which begins on the first of August. An ancient custom is that flowers and herbs are blessed on this day because when the tomb was opened for St. Thomas there was a sweet flowery fragrance coming



The great significance of this Feast of the Falling Asleep of the Mother of God is that Mary is a model of how we should live for God. She is the Mother of God, our mother and our protectress.



From the LUC ARCHIVES (1933 – present) – 3 APXIBIB

Vera Darya Spikula (April 2, 1914 - October 17, 1997)



Vera and Andrea Spikula were young ladies of Saint Nicholas Cathedral in Chicago in the 1930s during the time when the original UCYL was founded. When Father Ambrose Senyshyn, OSBM, became the pastor there he was acquainted with them. He was named and consecrated by Archbishop Bohachevsky as his auxiliary bishop 1942. His official residence became the pre-

sent Stamford Museum building popularly known as The Chateau. When Bishop Ambrose arrived in Stamford, he witnessed the existence of Saint Basil Prep School for boys and St. Basil College Seminary, BUT THERE WAS NO SCHOOL for young Ladies. Bishop Senyshyn's memory was fine and he remembered the apostolate of the two Spikula girls and invited them to Stamford to set up a girls' school which was named Mother of God Academy. Vera Spikula had a background in education and so she became the Principal and Headmistress of the academy in Stamford with its own property on the west side of Stamford (away from the resident boys!). Andrea Spikula, under Senyshyn's guidance and with the blessing of Archbishop Bohachevsky, entered the religious life and became the first Superior for life of the new group known as the Congregation of the Missionary Sisters of the Mother of God (MSMG). Vera Spikula eventually was provided with a residence in close proximity to the academy and to the sister's new convent. Vera remained the one principal of Mother of God Academy until its closing in the 1990s. She passed away during my time as Rector of St. Vladimir Cathedral (from 1996-2006). I celebrated her funeral Liturgy and I believe she is buried in Our Lady of Sorrows Cemetery in Langhorne, Pa, the same cemetery where her beloved sister, other deceased members of MSMG, as well as Bishop Walter Paska, are buried. As for the MSMG's present status, they have one convent in Philadelphia on North Franklin St on the opposite side of the Cathedral. The Missionary Sisters are the ones who have organized and run the Treasury of Faith Museum in the Cathedral basement.

I was the chaplain to Mother of God Academy and the Sisters from 1978 to 1986. (Msgr. John Terlecki)

It was during Ukrainian Week, August 13 to 19, 1933 at the World's Fair, when some of the young people of Chicago formed a Temporary Committee for the purpose of having a Convention of the Ukrainian Youth from the United States and Canada in order that they might organize a League. The members of the Committee were: Vera Spikula, Mary Dziavronyk, Helen Bahry, Stephanie Blidy, Bohdan Katamay, John Kaniuk and Steve Schurko.

The Convention was held on August 19, 1933, with almost 100 delegates from the many youth organizations of the United States and Canada. The Convention started at 9 AM with the Divine Liturgy at the St. Nicholas Church and the Missionary Father E. Theodorovych delivered the welcoming address to the delegates. All the delegates were registered at the St. Nicholas Church Hall. At one o'clock, Vera Spikula, the chairman of the Temporary Committee opened the meeting of the delegates and guests with a short address. The meeting lasted 2 hours, in which many speeches were delivered. Afterward, all delegates were photographed. (I am still looking for those photos – fr. M.P). At 3:30, the Convention business meeting took place, at which the League was organized. The name

of the League was: "Ukrainian American and Canadian Catholic Youth League".

All the members decided to have two Committees – the Honorary and Executive. The members of the Honorary Committee were: His Excellency the Most Rev. Ukrainian Catholic Bishop of the United States of America, Constantine Bohachevsky; His Excellency the Most Rev. Ukrainian Catholic Bishop of Canada, Basil Ladyka; Rev. Missionary A. Truch (the one who wrote the "Lives of the Saints" in four volumes); Brother Methodius; and Rev. B. Tremba. The Executive Committee consisted of: Bohdan Katamay, president: Vera Spikula, first vice-president; William Ewaskiw of Winnipeg, Second vice-president; Helen Bahry, corresponding secretary; Stephany Blidy, recording secretary; and Mary Dziayronyk, treasurer.

All the members decided that the Executive Committee should develop a Constitution; there were to be two representatives from every city who would be responsible for the clubs in their cities: that the journal be edited as soon as possible; and that we should ask all the Rev. Fathers of the Ukrainian Churches to help us. It was also determined that we appeal to our parents for aid. The session finished with the idea that the delegates would meet again in some city again next year and left the decision as to what city for the Executive Committee to decide. The business meeting finished at 6:20 PM after which all the delegates attended a banquet at the Ukrainian Pavilion in the World's Fair. During the banquet the delegates enjoyed concert and dancing.

When the Executive Committee started their work, they realized that the name "Ukrainian American and Canadian Catholic Youth League" was too lengthy Consequently they shortened it to "Ukrainian Catholic Youth League". Then the Committee members immediately started a collection for money in Chicago and collected \$40.00. Now 5000 shares are being issued and sold at the cost of \$1.00 each for the further financial strengthening.

CONSTITUTION

Since all of our Ukrainian Youth do not read Ukrainian well, we decided to have the Constitution both in English and Ukrainian. Mr. Bohdan Katamay constructed the Constitution and then at the few successive meetings it was modified and completed to its present form. The Constitution consists of twelve articles.

Article I. denotes the name.

- II. states the objective.
- III. cites the ways and means by which the youth can be organized.
- IV. continues the ways and means.
- V. informs us as to the eligibility for membership.
- VI. gives the duties and rights of the members.
- VII. sums up the instructions and the work that the delegates and representatives are to do.
- VIII. deals with the administration of the League, which includes the Honorary and Executive Committees.
- IX. specifies the duties of the Committee.
- X. designates the place and the procedure of the Executive Committee meetings.
- XI. discusses the possibility of dissolution of the League.
- XII. is related to amendments.

RESOLUTIONS

The Executive Committee also has listed the resolutions which the League must follow...

Let us hope that the League will be a great success and accomplishes everything that they set out to do. With your help and backing this can be accomplished. (Stephanie Blidy (Recording

Venerable Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky

was born as Count Roman Aleksander Maria Sheptytsky (Szeptycki) in a village Prylbychi near Lviv of Ukrainian origin. His family was in the 19th c. had become polonized. Roman Catholic and French-speaking. Among his ancestors there were many important church figures, including two metropolitans of Kiev, Atanasy and Lev. His maternal grandfather was the Polish writer Aleksander Fredro. One of his brothers, Klymentiy Sheptytsky, became a Studite monk, and another, Stanisław, became a military general in the Polish Army.

Roman received his education first at home and then in Kraków. After graduating he went to serve in the Austro-Hungarian army but after a few months fell sick and was forced to abandon it. Instead he studied law in Kraków and Wrocław, receiving his doctorate in 1888. During his studies

he visited Italy, where he was granted an audience with Pope Leo XIII at the Vatican, and to the Ukrainian heartland of Kiev, then under Russian rule, where he met some of the most prominent Ukrainian personalities of that time.

Despite his father's opposition. Roman became a monk at the Basilian monastery in Dobromyl, returning to his roots to serve what was regarded as the peasant Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church. He took the name Andrew, after Saint Andrew the First Called, He then studied at the Jesuit Seminary in Kraków, receiving a doctoral degree in theology in 1894. In 1892 was ordained a priest in Peremyshl. He was made rector of the Monastery of St. Onuphrius in Lviv in 1896.

In 1899, following the death of Cardinal Sylvester Sembratovych, Fr. Andrew became a Bishop of Stanyslaviv (now Ivano-Frankivsk). He was consecrated as bishop in Lviv on 17 September 1899 by Metropolitan Julian Sas-Kuilovsky assisted by Bishop Chekhovych and Bishop Weber, the Latin-Rite auxiliary of Lviv. A year later, on December 12, 1900 he was appointed, at the age of thirty-six, Metropolitan Archbishop of Lviv and enthroned on January 17, 1901.

Metropoplitan Andrew visited North America in 1910 where he met with Ukrainian Greek Catholic immigrant communities in the United States; attended the twenty-first International Eucharistic Congress in Montreal; toured Ukrainian communities in Canada; and invited the Redemptorist fathers ministering in the Byzantine rite to come to Ukraine.

After the outbreak of World War I, Sheptytsky was arrested by the Russian government and imprisoned in various places in the Ukraine and Russia. He was released in March 1918 and returned to Lviv from Russia... *

Sheptytsky died in 1944 and is buried in St. George's Cathedral in Lviv. In 1958 the cause for his canonization was begun. Pope Francis approved his life of heroic virtue on July 16, 2015, thus proclaiming him to be Venerable.

+Metropolitan-Archbishop Emeritus Stephen Sulyk (October 2, 1924 — April 6, 2020)



Stephen Sulvk was born to Michael and Mary Denys Sulvk on October 2, 1924 in Balnycia, a village in the Lemko District of the Carpathian mountains in Western Ukraine. In 1944, he graduated from high school in Sambir. After graduation, the events of World War II forced him to leave his native land and share the experience of a

He entered the Ukrainian Catholic Seminary of the Holy Spirit in Hirschberg, Germany. In 1948, he migrated to the United States and continued his priestly studies at Saint Josaphat's Seminary and The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C.

In 1952, he received his S.T.L. degree from the Catholic University of America and was ordained to the priesthood on June 14, 1952 at the Immaculate Conception Cathedral in Philadelphia.

After ordination, he served as assistant pastor in Omaha, Nebraska; Brooklyn, N.Y; St. Nicholas parish in Minersville,, Pa., and Youngstown, Ohio. He received his first pastoral assignment in 1955 in Phoenixville, Pa. with the additional responsibilities as **Chancery Secretary.**

From July 1, 1957 until October 5, 1961 he was pastor of St. Michael's Church in Frackville, Pa. During his short tenure of four vears, he built, furnished and paid for a new church and parish social hall. Annual gross income rose from \$10,000 in 1957 to \$60,000 in what was considered a financially depressed area.

After a short stay at St. Nicholas parish in Philadelphia, on March 22, 1962, he was appointed pastor of Assumption Church, Perth Amboy, N.J. Within a year, he completed a new elementary school. During his pastorate, he converted the rectory into a convent for nuns, built a new rectory, purchased and landscaped additional parish grounds and renovated the parish church. He also compiled and printed a series of bi-lingual texts for use in liturgical services. On May 31, 1968, His Holiness Pope Paul VI granted him the dignity of Papal Chaplain with the title of Monsignor.

Archbishop Sulvk was appointed Metropolitan-Archbishop of Philadelphia by St. John Paul II on December 29, 1980 and was consecrated bishop in Rome on March 1, 1981. The principal Consecrator was His Beatitude Josyf Cardinal Slipyi, and the Principal Co-Consecrators were Bishop Basil H. Losten, Bishop of Stamford and Bishop Nilus Nicholas Savaryn, O.S.B.M. Bishop of Edmonton.

He supervised the construction of a new chancery center and bishop's residence and cathedral rectory. He renovated the sanctuary of the Immaculate Conception Cathedral and landscaped the adjoining grounds. He established the Seminary Endowment Fund to finance the education of seminarians and to provide income for St. Josaphat's Seminary.

At the request of the Vatican, he was involved in sensitive diplomatic talks with members of the Orthodox Church in Ukraine at the time the Soviet Union was collapsing, Ukraine was becoming an independent nation and the Ukrainian Catholic Church was emerging from its existence as a persecuted catacomb church under atheistic communism of the Soviets.

He has served on various committees of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and the Synod of Bishops of the Ukrainian Catholic Church.

Upon reaching the canonical age for retirement, St. John Paul II accepted his resignation on November 29, 2000.

June 14, 2002 was the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the Holy Priesthood and his Golden Jubilee was observed with the celebration of a hierarchical Divine Liturgy and a testimonial banquet on June 23, 2002.

October 1, 2019, he was honored by the Archeparchy on the occasion of his 95th birthday.

During his retirement years, he lived in Cherry Hill, N.J.

He was predeceased by his parents and the following siblings: Ivan, Vasyl, Dmytro, Anna Nicholas and Ivan, Jr.

In addition to several nieces and nephews, he is survived by the following cousins: Frank Stec (Christine), Steve Boyduy, Lidia Devonshire, Theresa Nord (Tim), Donna Sauchak (Greg), Stephen Stec (Tonya), Kristin Magar (Steve), Lauren Stec and Jordan Stec.

Due to the coronoavirus pandemic, private funeral services for the late Metroplitan-Archbishop Stephen was conducted on Bright Monday, April 13, 2020 by Metropolitan-Archbishop Borys Gudziak in the Ukrainian Catholic Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. Philadelphia, Pa. He was buried in the cathedral crypt next to +Bishop Soter Ortynsky, +Bishop Constantine Bohachevsky and +Metropolitan Ambrose Senyshyn.

Many years ago a nun came into my life who helped mold me into an adult who possesses a strong love of God, of our beautiful Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church and of our rich Ukrainian heritage.

As a boy enrolled in public school, three late afternoons each week and much of each Saturday I attended what we called "Sister School" taught by the Sisters of Saint Basil the Great at Saint Vladimir Church in Scranton, Pennsylva-

nia. Over the years a number of good Sisters were assigned to our Scranton parish, but there is one who has remained indelibly etched in my memory - Sister Vladimira Melnyk. She was a gentle soul who loved her calling in life and the people both young and old with whom she came into contact. It was so easy to learn from Sister because she was gifted as an educator and related so comfortably to children.
