October is Clergy Appreciation Month

October is the perfect time to take a moment to recognize the sacrifices that our priests make which often go unnoticed, and to show them how much we appreciate their presence within our lives. Clergy pray and worry about their parishioners, just as much as we care for and love our families. Their meals and family events are often interrupted by phone calls from parishioners going through a personal crisis and in need of their prayers or support.



Clergy are there for us when we experience the loss of loved ones, and they are there to help us celebrate the birth of our children and their sacraments of baptism, confirmation, Eucharist, and marriage. Clergy often listen to our hardships and struggles, and they do their best to provide meaningful

quidance, while also helping to restore our faith. They often deal with interpersonal conflicts among parishioners, and they continually try to help people reconcile their differences with one another.

Clergy are the leaders of our faith, they help us find meaning in the Word of God, and they shepherd their flock both night and day. The concept

of clergy appreciation can be traced back to the Apostle Paul's letter in the New Testament, where he acknowledges that elders who direct the affairs of the church well should be given double honor, especially those who teach and preach (1 Tim. 5:17).



I recently read a true story that a man wrote about the pastor of his church. There was a stray kitten that climbed up a tree in his backyard and then was afraid to come down. The pastor coaxed the kitten, offered warm milk, etc. The kitty would not come down. The tree was not sturdy enough to climb, so the pastor decided that if he tied a rope to his car and pulled it until the tree branch bent down far enough, he could then reach up and bring the kitten to safety.

So that is what the pastor did, all the while checking his progress in the car. The pastor then figured if he went just a

little bit further, the tree would be bent sufficiently for him to reach the kitten. But as he moved the car a little further forward, the rope broke. The tree went 'boing!' and the kitten instantly sailed through the air and out of sight. The pastor felt terrible. He walked all over the neighborhood asking people if they had seen a little kitten. But no one had seen hide nor hair of the kitten. So the pastor prayed, "Lord, I just commit this kitten to your keeping," and went on about his busi-



A few days later the pastor was at the grocery store, and met one of his parishioners. He happened to look into her shopping cart and was amazed to see cat food. He knew that this woman did not like pets, she thought they were messy, so he asked her, "Why are you buying cat food when you do

not have any pets?" She replied, "You won't believe this, Father," and then she told him how her little girl had been begging her for a kitten, but she kept refusing. A few days later, the child had begged again, so she finally told her little girl, "Well, if God gives you a cat, I'll let you keep it."

Then she told the pastor, "I watched my child go out in the backyard, get on her knees, and ask God

for a kitten. And I am telling you the God's honest truth, Father, because you really won't believe this, but I saw it with my own eyes. A kitten suddenly came flying out of the blue sky, with its paws outspread, and landed right in front of her. What do you make of that?"



More often than not, clergy teach us valuable lessons each and every day, and their kindness and faith helps us to move mountains. If you have such a pastor, make sure that you thank him. 



Lviv, June 30, 2024—During the celebration of the Hierarchical Divine Liturgy in the Garrison Church of the Holy Prime Apostles Peter and Paul, located in the heart of Lviv, Deacon Volodymyr Sabalo was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Paul Chomnycky, OSBM, the Eparch of Stamford.

Fr. Volodymyr was born in the Berezhany, Ternopil region, where he grew up in a devout Catholic family. His

early life was marked by active participation in the local church community. He worked with children and youth, and organized the summer camp "Joyful Holidays with God" in his home parish. After completing his education in landscape design at the Berezhany Agro technical Institute, he entered the Ternopil Major Theological Seminary of Patriarch Josyf Slipyj. Later he traveled to the United States to study at St. Basil Seminary in Stamford, CT. After several years of study, he returned to Ukraine and completed his theological studies at the Kyiv Theological Seminary of the Three Holy Hierarchs, where he earned a Master's degree in Theology.

In the summer of 2023, Fr. Volodymyr married his wife, Julia, and later, on August 6th, Fr. Volodymyr was ordained as a deacon by Bishop Paul Chomnycky in Ss. Peter & Paul Church in Lviv.

Remembering +Bishop Basil Losten (1930 – 2024)

As a longtime member of the League of Ukrainian Catholics of America and an officer of the National Board for many years, I had the opportunity to work closely with Bishop Basil Losten from the time of his Episcopal



ordination in 1971, as the Auxiliary Bishop of Philadelphia.

Bishop Losten was a staunch supporter of the League, always commending the work and accomplishments of the LUC. He promoted our work within the parishes, showing his love for the Church and for Ukraine. He encouraged the League to promote the Cause for the Beatification of Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky.

From my early days as a board member, I remember that when Bishop Losten served in Philadelphia, he established a home office at the Chancery for the League, where the officers were able to hold their regular meetings and where he would join in the discussions, provide encouragement, and give us direction and ideas to move forward, in order to continue the work of the LUC in service to the Church.

Bishop Losten was present for many of the functions of the League, be it a Convention or Sports Rally. He saw to it that the members would be involved in Eparchial events. When in Stamford, he continued to work with the officers and members. He sought out the League to participate in the *Youth for Christ* celebration, hosting an exhibit on Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky.

In our 1982 Convention Journal, Bishop Losten wrote the following message: "As you are well aware, I have always had, first as a lay member, then as a priest and now as a bishop, a high regard for the ideals of the League of Ukrainian Catholics and for its members. I have taken advantage of every opportunity to publicly applaud your zeal and your dedication, calling attention to the selfless concern you reveal, and the good works you perform for our Ukrainian Catholic Church and people. Admirably, you tenderly nurture the gifts you received from your parents; preserving, cherishing and promoting the beauty and richness of our Ukrainian rite and culture. I am proud to be numbered among you." He prayed that the "gathering of the best sons and daughters of our Ukrainian Catholic Church result in our personal spiritual enrichment and in a heightened enthusiasm and strength in our work for our Church".

Bishop Losten always took a personal interest in the work of the LUC, asked about the League's plans for the future, and continued to encourage the members even after his retirement. His care and concern for the LUC was very evident from the above message, for which we are forever indebted.

Bishop Losten will long be remembered for his dedication to the Church, and to the people and to the League of Ukrainian Catholics for which we are so grateful.

In blessed sleep, grant eternal rest, O Lord, to your ever to be remembered servant +Bishop Basil H. Losten, and make his memory everlasting. Vichnaya Pamyat'!

Bishop Basil Harry Losten was born in Chesapeake City, Maryland, on May 11, 1930, a son of the late Ivan Losten and Julia Petryshyn Losten. He embarked on a life of faith and service that began with his early education at St. Basil School in Philadelphia. His journey into the priesthood was marked by years of dedicated study, first at the Ukrainian Catholic Seminary in Stamford and later at St. Basil College, where he earned a bachelor of arts in philosophy. His theological education culminated in a graduate degree from the Catholic University of America in 1957.

He was ordained to the priesthood on June 10, 1957, by Bishop Constantine Bohachevsky. His initial assignments saw him serve the Philadelphia Archdiocese as chancery secretary, and serve among various parishes across the city. In 1962, he was appointed personal secretary to Archbishop-Metropolitan Ambrose Senyshyn.

In 1968, Pope Paul VI recognized his contributions by elevating him to the rank of papal chamberlain. On March 23, 1971, he was nominated to the episcopacy, and on May 25th of that year, he was consecrated as auxiliary bishop. He later served as apostolic administrator of the diocese in 1976, during the declining health of Archbishop-Metropolitan Senyshyn. On September 20, 1977, he was appointed diocesan bishop of the Diocese of Stamford.

Since 1992, he had been an active member of the Kyiv Study Group on Ecumenism, and since 1995, a member of the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity. He was also a member of the United States Conference of Bishops.

Upon reaching retirement age, Bishop Basil submitted his resignation, which was accepted on January 3, 2006.

On August 21, 2007, the President of Ukraine, Viktor Yushchenko, awarded Bishop Losten the Order of Merit III Degree, "for his significant personal contribution to strengthening the authority of Ukraine in the world.

Bishop Basil went for his Eternal Reward on September 15, 2024. He is survived by many nieces and nephews. Besides his parents, he is predeceased by his siblings: Michael, Edward, John, Nicholas, Stephen, Stella Zukowsky, Mary Humen and Ann.

On the weekend of September 14-15, 2024, Saint Vladimir Ukrainian Catholic Church in Arnold, PA, was finally reopened, after a devastating fire on December 4, 2021, destroyed much of the former church. The front bell towers and the sacristy area were salvageable and incorporated into the new, smaller church building.

Most Reverend Bishop Bohdan J. Danylo of the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of Saint Josaphat in Parma, OH, assisted by Father Yaroslav Koval (pastor), Very Reverend Mitred Archpriest Michael Polosky (Saints Peter and Paul, Ambridge), Very Reverend Igor Hohosha (Saint George, Pittsburgh), and Father Oleg Popyuk (Assumption of the Mother of God. Latrobe) began the "Order of Consecration of a Church and Holy Table" at 4:00 PM on Saturday, September 14th. The church was filled to capacity with parishioners and guests, including Very Reverend Father Anthony Balistreri (retired, former pastor of Saint Vladimir) and Deacon and Mrs. Stephen Suchan. After the cleansing and anointing of the Holy Table, Hierarchial Divine Vespers were prayed. Deacon Myron J. Spak also served, while Michael and Stephanie Vargo led the laity responses.

Following vespers, there was a fellowship meal in the social hall featuring Saint Vladimir's famous pyrohy, which were voted the Best Pierogies of 2024, in a contest sponsored by the "Pittsburgh Live Today" show on KDKA television.

On Sunday, September 15th, the reopening ceremonies continued from 11:00 AM with a procession of the Antimension, vesting of the Holy Table by the placing of the Antimension on it, and blessing and anointing of the church walls, followed by an Hierarchical Divine Liturgy concelebrated by Bishop Danylo with Father Yaroslav Koval, Very Reverend Douglas Lorance (Saint Michael, Lyndora), and Father Ivan Chirovsky (Saints Cyril and Methodius Seminary). The church was again filled to overflowing as the first Divine Liturgy was celebrated in the new church building. The ceremonies concluded with a banquet at the Hillcrest Country Club.

Святий Миколаю Чарнецький, моли Бога за нас...

Рік 2024 проголошено Роком блаженного священномученика Миколая Чарнецького. З нагоди вшанування 140-ліття з дня народження та 65-х роковин смерті відомого діяча УГКЦ на його малій батьківщині, у селі Семаківцях, на Городенківщині, впродовж року відбуваються різні заходи, покликані «поширити в народі прославу блаженного».



Однією із важливих подій стала наукова конференція «Блаженний священномученик Миколай Чарнецький – дорога праведника за утвердження української державності та відродження УГКЦ».

Конференції передував Молебень за участю єпископа-помічника владики Петра Голінея Коломийської єпархії УГКЦ у церкві Миколая Чарнецького в Семаківцях у співслужінні з парохом храму о.

Василем Скрипкою, який ε багатолітнім популяризатором постаті владики Чарнецького, а також місцевого духовенства.



По його завершенні урочисто відкрили та освятили пам'ятну таблицю о. Миколаю Чарнецькому на одному з корпусів Семаківської ґімназії – колишній плебанії, де пройшли дитячі роки майбутнього єпископа.

Основною метою згаданої конференції, стало дослідження, вивчення та популяризація імені єпископа, а також визначення його ролі й місця в утвердженні УГКЦ та Української Соборної Держави у площині вивчення історії України, релігієзнавства, філософії української думки, розвитку української мови.

Першим із доповіддю «Блаженний Миколай Чарнецький і формація підпільного духовенства УГКЦ» виступив Преосвященний владика Петро Голіней, доктор східних церковних наук. У ній єпископ зазначив: «Із ліквідацією Греко-Католицької Церкви у місцях позбавлення волі опинилися всі єпископи, сотні священиків, монахів, монахинь і тисячі вірних. Але сподівання більшовиків, що ув'язнені греко-католики відмовляться від своєї віри не справджувалися. Ув'язнене духовенство, ризикуючи потрапити під тяжчі репресії, продовжувало виконувати пастирські обов'язки в середовищі ув'язнених вірних проголошуючи Євангеліє. Найгероїчнішою місією в ув'язненні стали окремі випадки навчання кандидатів до священства та рукоположень на дияконів та священиків.

Із виходом на свободу значної кількості греко-католицького духовенства в середині 50-х. рр., серед котрих були і колишні викладачі Львівської Богословської Академії та Станіславівської семінарії, стало можливим думати про більш організований вишкіл нових кандидатів до священства. Справжньою надією на відродження Церкви став вихід на свободу єпископа Миколая Чарнецького. Але ця «свобода» обмежувалась безперервними напа-



дами атеїстичної системи. Для виховання нових священиків владика Миколай Чарнецький в 1956 р. організовує навчання біля Львова в Зимній Воді.

Знаменито, що підготовка першої генерації священиків в умовах підпілля була досить вдала. Це стало важливим фактором для виховання священиків в майбутньому. З числа священиків, яких висвятив владика Миколай Чарнецький, вийшли майбутні вихователі священичого стану: о. Павло Василик (згодом єпископ), о. Євстахій Смаль, о. Микола Волосянко, о. Михайло Винницький та о. Михаїл Косило. Практично з перших років свого пастирського служіння згадані отці долучаються до пошуку та підготовки нових кандидатів до священства. Молодша генерація вихователів виявляла велику відвагу та ревність, але їм бракувало ще досвіду та обережності, яка була притаманна старшим священикам».

Загалом у роботі конференції взяли участь науковці зі Львова, Івано-Франківська, Коломиї, Чернівців, а також представники духовенства та місцевої влади.

The year 2024 has been declared the Year of the Blessed Holy Martyr Mykola Charnetsky. On the occasion of commemorating the 140th anniversary of the birth and the 65th anniversary of the death of this famous figure of the UGCC, in his small homeland, and in

the village of Semakivtsi, within the Horodenkiv region, various events were held throughout the year, designed to "spread the praise of the blessed among the people".

One of the important events was the scientific conference "Blessed Hieromartyr Mykola Charnetsky - the path of a righteous

scholar for the establishment of Ukrainian statehood and the revival of the UGCC".

The conference started with a Moleben service. After its completion, they solemnly dedicated the memorial tablet of Fr. Mykola Char-



netsky, in one of the buildings of the Semakiv Gymnasium - the former presbytery, where the future bishop spent his childhood years.

The main goal of the conference was to research, study and popularize the name of the bishop, as well as to determine his role and place in the establishment of the UGCC and the Ukrainian State in the field of studying the history of Ukraine, religious studies, the philosophy of Ukrainian thought, and the development of the Ukrainian language.

Blessed Bishop-Martyr Mykola Charnetsky, C.Ss.R.

Blessed Bishop-Martyr Mykola Charnetsky, C.Ss.R, was beatified by St. John Paul II on June 27, 2001 in Lviv, Ukraine, and is commemorated on June 27th.

Blessed Bishop Mykola Charnetsky was born on December 14, 1884 in the village of Semakivtsi, within the Horodenka District.

Upon his graduation from the seminary, he was ordained to the priesthood on October 2, 1909. He obtained his doctorate in dogmatic theology from Rome, and then became a spiritual director and professor at the seminary in Stanislaviv (Ivano-Frankivsk).



In 1919, he entered the novitiate of the Redemptorist Fathers in Zboiska, near Lviv. In 1926, Pope Pius XI, upon the request of Metropolitan Andrey, appointed Fr Mykola as the Apostolic Visitor to Greek Catholics in Volyn and Polissia. The ceremony of his ordination to the episcopacy took place on February 2, 1931, in Rome.

During the first Bolshevik occupation, Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky appointed him as the Apostolic Exarch of Volyn and Pidlassia. On April 11, 1945, he was arrested by the NKVD and sentenced to six years of forced labor in Siberia.

According to official records, he underwent 600 hours of interrogation and torture, and spent time in 30 different prisons and camps. Terminally ill, in 1956, he was permitted to return to western Ukraine, where he secretly continued to fulfill his episcopal obligations in the underground church of the catacombs.

In the midst of the cruelty and oppression which he suffered in imprisonment and in exile, he was distinguished for his evangelical patience, gentleness, limitless goodness, and holiness.

During his lifetime, he was considered by the faithful, a holy man. As a consequence of his sufferings, he died a martyr for the faith on April 2, 1959 in Lviv, and is known as "the healer of souls" by the faithful. He is often called the "Ukrainian St. Nicholas".
