

+Rev. Dr. Czeslaw Michal Krysa



Rev. Dr. Czeslaw Michal Krysa, SLD, passed away on Monday, June 9, 2025. He was 70. Born September 12, 1954, in Niagara Falls, New York, to immigrant parents, the late Stanislaw and late Zofia "Sophia" (nee Magdziak)

He had his master's in theology and licentiate of sacred theology from St. Paul University, Ottawa, Canada; a master's in liturgical studies from the University of Notre Dame; a licentiate of sacred scripture and sacrae theologiae doctor from the Pontifical International Institute of San Anselmo in Rome. He earned his Master of Divinity degree from SS. Cyril & Methodius Seminary in Orchard Lake, Michigan.

Rev. Krysa was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Edward Head at Holy Trinity Church in Niagara Falls, New York, his home parish, where Fr. Krysa was baptized into the faith on the Feast of St. Stephen in 1954, and where he received First Holy Communion and the rite of Confirmation.


Father Krysa's first clerical assignment brought him to St. John Gualbert Parish in Cheektowaga, New York, as assistant pastor.

In 1984, he joined the staff of SS. Cyril & Methodius Seminary. In 1993, he was named vice rector of SS. Cyril & Methodius Seminary.

After returning to the Buffalo Diocese in 2003, he was named temporary administrator for SS. Peter & Paul Church, in Arcade, and St. Mary in East Arcade. In 2005, he took on the added responsibilities of episcopal vicar of the Tri-County Vicariate. In October of that year, he was named pastor of SS. Peter & Paul, St. Mary, as well as Blessed Sacrament in Delevan, and Holy Family Church in Machias.

In 2008, he took on the added responsibilities of part-time director of the Office of Worship, a position he held until 2020. He became pastor of SS. Hyacinth & Hedwig Parish in Dunkirk, in June of 2008.

He was named rector of St. Casimir Church in May 2011 and remained there until his passing into Eternal Life. The members of LUC visited St. Casimir in September 2023. during our LUC Convention. From that time, Father was a member of the League of Ukrainian Catholics at his own request.



with the traditional bread and salt by the pastor, Reverend Father Yaroslav Koval, and parishioners, Michael and Stephanie Vargo.





Searching For Ukrainian Ancestors in Pittsburgh

Under the pastorship of Reverend Father Yaroslav Koval, Saint John the Baptist Ukrainian Catholic Church, 109 South Seventh Street, Pittsburgh, PA 15203, has begun a project of building a database of the Birth and Baptismal records of the parish from its beginning. At present, the project contains Birth records from October 28, 1891, through September 13, 1899. The listings are published in English and Ukrainian.





Child's Sex; Parents' Names (Father and Mother and Religion of each - Greek Catholic or Roman Catholic, and the names of the parents of the Father and Mother (i.e. Grandparents); Place of Origin of Parents (village or city, county, country in Europe); Place of Residence of Parents; Godparents' Names and Religion of each; and Name of the Baptizing Priest. Please Note: Not all the listings contain all the possible information.

Presently, all the listings are printed (in English and Ukrainian) on large plastic sheets which are mounted on the walls of the adjacent school hall. It is the intention that this information be placed into an online database as the project moves forward.

Additionally, Father Yaroslav and parishioners have been researching the early beginnings of the parish. They have determined that Saint John's Church building is the oldest church building in the United States in which the Divine Liturgy of the Ukrainian Rite has been continuously celebrated. Inquiries about family ancestors should be in writing. When writing to Saint John's Church, please consider a donation towards the repair and upkeep of this very important church building in the history of the Ukrainian Catholic Rite in America. GATHERING THE SCATTERED:

League of Ukrainian Catholics and Ukrainian Catholic Bishops Unite Ukrainians Around the World Through 'A Journey of Hope in the Jubilee Year 2025'


Thousands of people, Ukrainian and others, have enjoyed our unique Virtual Spiritual Retreats the past 5 years. In response to the Covid shutdown in 2020, the League of Ukrainian Catholics organized its first ever online program with the Ukrainian Catholic Bishops of the United States titled "Transforming Calamity into Unity, Dignity & Healing" on October 10, 2020. The response was widespread and amazing. People loved the deep spiritual perspectives shared by our bishops with their keen ability to anchor our anxieties and refocus on our faith as the fountain of strength and unity. This gave way to our annual virtual spiritual retreats thanks to the continued support of our Ukrainian Catholic Bishops of the US.

While the pandemic eventually took a back burner, the unprovoked and brutal war in Ukraine put our faith to the test once more. In addition to internally displaced persons, millions of Ukrainians left their homeland to escape the terrors of war. According to the Center for Economic Strategy (https://ces.org.ua) as of the end of November 2024, 5.2 million Ukrainian refugees remain abroad, and approximately 4.2 million Ukrainians hold temporary protection status in European countries. The largest number is in Germany (1.2 million), Poland (988,000), and the Czech Republic (385,000).

A major challenge and a priority for our Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church (UGCC) is to provide an avenue to ensure unity, specifically, spiritual unity, to those scattered throughout many countries and continents.

Quoting UGCC Bishop Kenneth Nowakowski, of the Eparchy of the Holy Family, London, (Vatican News podcast interview with Christopher Wells), the priority of the Holy Synod of Bishops of the UGCC "has to be the pastoral care of our Ukrainian people throughout the world, especially in Ukraine and those who have arrived in Western Europe, and indeed in other parts of the world," as a result of Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine".

With this in mind, and in consideration of the Holy Jubilee Year theme 'Pilgrims of Hope', the League of Ukrainian Catholics in harmony with the Stamford Eparchy, organized two virtual retreats: 'A Journey of Hope in the Jubilee Year 2025'.



The first Jubilee Year retreat on March 30th, in English, was conducted by the Ukrainian Catholics Bishop of the US; Archbishop Borys Gudziak, Metropolitan Archbishop of the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchy of Philadelphia; Bishop Paul Chomnycky of the Stamford Eparchy in Connecticut, Bishop Benedict Aleksiychuk of the St. Nicholas Eparchy in Chicago, and Bishop Bohdan Danylo of the St. Josephat Eparchy in Parma, Ohio.

The bishops explored these topics in loving detail:

THE JUBILEE YEAR: What is it and why is it important?
THE DEEPER MEANING OF HOPE: It's not wishful thinking.
HOPE AND HEALING: Security in times of uncertainty.
BECOMING PILGRIMS OF HOPE:

Recognizing the signs and fanning the flames.

This was followed by a period of reflection with open discussion between the participants and bishops.



In our first all Ukrainian event, the second virtual retreat took place the following week. This time with UGCC bishops in Ukraine: Bishop Stepan Sus, head of the Pastoral and Migration Department of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church; Bishop Andriy Khimyak, Auxiliary Bishop of the Kyiv Archdiocese of the UGCC & Secretary of the Synod of Bishops of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church; Bishop Maksym Ryabukha, Exarch of Donetsk, and Bishop Josaphat Moshchych, Eparch of Chernivtsi, Head of the Patriarchal Commission for Evangelization of the UGCC. Bishop Paul Chomnycky served as moderator for this retreat.



The retreat topics were the same as above but delivered from their unique perspectives as pastoral leaders in war torn Ukraine.

How well did these two retreats unite Ukrainians around the world? Over 300 people participated in the live virtual retreats via ZOOM, while well over 500 viewed the posts/recordings from the League of Ukrainian Catholics website. Visits to our LUC website since the end of March reached over 1,200. Even more amazing is the geographical distribution of viewers and participants. They are from Belgium, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Ireland, Lithuania, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Sweden, Switzerland, United Kingdom, Ukraine (13 oblasts), and the United States.

We are deeply grateful to our dear bishops, in the US and abroad, for their ongoing leadership; those who guided us skillfully through our two virtual retreats, and to those bishops who shared the news of the upcoming events with the faithful. We are sincerely thankful to all participants who benefited from the wisdom and deep (and sometimes candid) discussions on the Journey of Hope. Many participants expressed their gratitude in having this unique opportunity to interact with our bishops, (especially in their native Ukrainian language) from the comfort and safety of their homes, and look forward to similar opportunities in the future.

Buffalo Deanery Jubilee Year Liturgy

The Jubilee Year 2025, themed "Pilgrims of Hope," is a special year of spiritual renewal and grace in the Catholic Church, which officially began on December 24, 2024, and will conclude on January 6, 2026. A jubilee year, also known as a holy year, is a special type of celebration within the Catholic Church focused on forgiveness, renewal, and pilgrimage. The late Pope Francis called on the faithful to become "Pilgrims of Hope," encouraging us to embark on a journey of faith, both literally through pilgrimages to Rome or other local designated sites throughout the world, and metaphorically through acts of charity and spiritual reflection.

In the Vatican decree on the granting of indulgences during the Ordinary Jubilee Year 2025, we read:

"An indulgence, a remission of the temporal punishment a person is due for their sins, has been a key feature of holy years for centuries. But updated norms for obtaining one are published for each holy year celebration. The faithful can obtain the Jubilee indulgence if, having celebrated the sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist, they devoutly visit any Jubilee designated site and there, for a suitable period of time, engage in Eucharistic adoration and meditation, concluding with the Our Father, the Profession of Faith in any legitimate form, and invocations to Mary, the Mother of God."



On Monday, August 18, 2025, there was a Special Jubilee of Hope Deanery Liturgy celebrated at Fatima Shrine in Lewiston, NY. Many of the faithful throughout our deanery came to share in this special liturgy, which was concelebrated by Father Mykola Drofych, Dean, Father Andriy Kasiyan, and our LUC spiritual director, Father Marijan Procyk. Deacon David Wik and Deacon

Derek Wiertel also served. Bishop Paul regretfully could not join us but had planned to be in attendance as our main celebrant. We continue to pray for his health. We also prayed for Ukraine, for those who are suffering in Ukraine, and for all those who have lost their lives during this horrific and unjust war. May the good Lord watch over the people of Ukraine, bringing a just victory soon, and may the Mother of God protect us all! (Susan Szczublewski)
